

So yes, you should still test your smoke alarms at least twice a year — the Daylight Saving Time change is a good reminder—and once a month is better, as recommended by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). ## 2021 Medication Take Back Events

Did you know that medications are the leading cause of poisoning in young children? Knowing that has caused us to find ways to get expired or unused medications out of the home setting to make them a little bit safer for young children. Several years ago, we started hosting drive up/drop off medication take back events in partnership with Altru Health System, the Grand Forks Sheriff's Department and Safe Kids Grand Forks. The dates for the 2021 events will be as follows:

#### March 23 - June 8 - September 21

We will host these events in the Hugo's parking lot on Columbia Road from 8 a.m. -12:30 p.m. Medications can be kept in their original container and labels do not need to be removed. As we get closer to these events, we hope you will clean out your medicine cabinets and bring pills, liquids, patches, ointments, etc. for disposal.



Warmer weather is on the way! That means dusting off your bike, rollerblades, scooter or skateboard. It's

important to make sure all the equipment is in working order on anything you plan to ride. Here are a few tips so that your child's ride will be as safe as possible.

- Wear a helmet and make sure it is the proper fit. (See next page for the Helmet Fit Test)
- Ensure proper bike fit by bringing the child along when shopping for a bike.
- When children are sitting on the seat of the bike their feet should be able to touch the ground.
- Long or loose clothing can get caught in bike chains or wheel spokes. Dress young kids appropriately to ensure a safe ride.
- Actively supervise children until you're comfortable that they are responsible to ride on their own.
- Every child is different, but developmentally it can be hard for kids to judge speed and distance of cars until age 10. Limit bike riding to sidewalks, parks or bike paths until age 10. No matter what teach your child to stay alert and watch for cars and trucks.
- Teach your kids to make eye contact with drivers. Bikers should make sure drivers are paying attention and are going to stop before they cross the street.
- Stop and look left, right and left again before entering a street or crossing an intersection. Look back and yield to traffic coming from behind before turning left.
- When riding at dusk, dawn or in the evening be bright and use lights. It's also smart to wear clothes and accessories that have retro-reflective materials to improve biker visibility to motorist.
- These same rules should be applied when biking, rollerblading, or scootering.

# Certified Child Passenger Technician Recertification & Testing Class

Safe Kids Grand Forks, Altru Health System & the Minnesota Office of Traffic Safety will be offering a class for car seat technicians needing to renew their certification (ones who were previously certified but have let their certification lapse). This class is a 9-hour testing day and participants need to review the course manual prior to class attendance. Former CPST's who are expired for more than 1 year are encouraged to retake the full CPST Certification Training in order to refresh their knowledge and skills.

# Does your helmet fit properly?

Take the Helmet Fit Test



Eyes: Put the helmet on your head. Look up. You should see the bottom rim of the helmet.



Ears: Make sure the straps form a 'V' under your ears when buckled. The straps should be a little tight but comfortable.



Mouth: Open your mouth as wide as you can. Does the helmet hug your head? If not, tighten the straps.



# **Playground Safety**

With spring right around the corner it's important to remember some safety tips while children are playing at the playground.

- Actively supervise children on the playground.
- Check playground where your children play. Look for age-appropriate equipment and hazards, such as rusted or broken equipment and dangerous surfaces.
- Teach children that pushing, shoving or crowding while on the playground can be dangerous
- Dress for the playground. Even helmets can be dangerous on a playground, so save those for bikes.
  - Falls are the most common type of injury, accounting for more than 75% of all playground-related injuries. Lack of or improper supervision is associated with approximately 45% of playground-related injuries.
- Little kids play differently than big kids. It is important to have a separate play area for children under 5.
- Avoid playgrounds with non-impact absorbing surfaces, such as asphalt, concrete, grass, dirt or gravel. Recommended surface material include: sand, pea gravel, wood chips, mulch and shredded rubber.

# 2021 North Dakota National Child Passenger Safety Technician Certification Training

### **Course Information**

This training provides basic technical skills, experience and knowledge about the proper use and installation of child car seats when working with parents and caregivers with child passenger safety needs.

### **Course Content**

This training will provide participants with the technical skills to:

- Identify and correct misuse of car safety seats
- Serve as a community resource at a variety of community events such as car seat checkups
- Educate others about child passenger safety issues
- Reduce potential liability through standardization
- Receive knowledge and skills to meet national certification

Certification is achieved through a combination of lectures, hands-on practice, role-playing and written and hands-on skills testing. The training concludes with a community car seat checkup. Participants must be in attendance for the entire course and successfully pass to receive certification.

# Take Safety with You This Spring

Spring break isn't just for the college crowd. Families are enjoying time away from their hectic, overscheduled lives and heading out of town to that perfect destination, whether modest, luxurious, or something in between. As you and the kids pack the sun screen, flip flops, ski jackets, or a combination of them all, don't forget an essential you won't want to leave behind – safety.

Hotels, motels, and rentals by owner can give you the escape you've been looking for during vacation travel. But keep in mind that on average, 1 of every 14 hotels or motels report a structure fire each year. It's just as important for you and your family to be prepared for an emergency when you're away as when you're at your own home.

#### **Hotels and Motels**

Choose a hotel/motel that is protected by smoke alarms, carbon monoxide alarms (CO), and a fire sprinkler system. At check-in, ask the front desk what the fire alarm sounds like. If the hotel/motel has CO alarms, ask what they sound like. Bring a travel CO alarm with you if your lodging does not have one. Review with your family the escape plan posted in the room. Keep the room key by your bed and take it with you if there is a fire. If the alarm sounds, everyone should leave right away. Use the

stairs and get low and go if you must escape through smoke. Decide on an outside meeting place for all members of the family to go to in case of emergency.



#### **Rentals by Owner**

- Regulations vary widely across jurisdiction at rentals by owner. Act as your own safety advocate, gathering information before your trip as outlined in the <u>Fire Safety at Your Home Away from Home</u> checklist. In addition to providing tips before the trip, the <u>Take Safety with You</u> infographic advises on safety once you're there.
- Smoke alarms should be on every level of the home, outside each sleeping area and inside every bedroom.
- Carbon monoxide alarms should be on every level of the home outside sleeping areas.
- Have an escape plan, two ways out of each room.
- Make sure there is a fire extinguisher in the home.
- Avoid deadly tip overs, don't let children climb on furniture.
- Keep cleaning supplies in a locked cabinet or out of reach of children.
- Keep all window cords out of reach of children.
- Always watch kids around water.
- Keep children away from drain pools.
- Know how to perform CPR on children and adults.

Once you're back at home, keep up the safety practices. Test smoke alarms using the test button and commit to making this a family activity every month. Kids can use <u>Sparky's Smoke Alarm Calendar</u> to check off each month when the smoke alarms have been tested.

Make a home fire escape plan with your children, guiding them as they draw a map of each level of your home using <u>Sparky's</u> <u>Home Fire Escape Plan</u>. Show all doors and windows. Go with them to each room and have them point to the two ways out. Practice the plan with everyone in your household.

Push the test button on your smoke alarm to begin a home fire escape drill. Practice getting low and going under the smoke. Use different ways out with each practice and close doors behind you as you go.

# **Farm Safety**

Visiting or living on a farm can be fun, but there are many hidden dangers to be aware of.

#### Farm Equipment

- One of the biggest hazards for children is the tractor. Being an extra rider on any tractor is dangerous, even if the tractor has a cab. Children can be injured or killed by falling from the tractor and being run over. The same could happen if they were riding in the back end of a pickup truck. A good rule of thumb is no seat, no rider.
- Children do not understand that piles of grain are not big sandboxes and that they can become trapped in just 3-4 seconds. Each year children suffocate in gravity flow wagons. Explain what suffocation means and the importance of not playing on the grain in a wagon, bin or truck. Stress that it only takes a few seconds to get trapped.

#### **Chemicals & Pesticides**

- Chemicals should be placed out of reach of children. In addition to educating children on pesticide safety, steps that adults can take to help avoid accidental poisoning include:
- When applying pesticides around the homes, remove children and their toys along with pets and their toys. Keep everyone away from the area that had been treated for at least the recommended amount of time.
- Properly dispose of empty pesticide containers.
- Store pesticides out of children's reach in a locked area.
- Never put rodent or insect baits where children can find them, pick them up and put them in their mouths.
- Teach children that pesticides are poison and something they should never touch or eat.
- Keep the telephone number of the poison control center (1-800-222-1222) near your pesticides.

#### Farm Animals

- Children need protection from animals that may attack or bite them. Parents should:
- Have rules to safeguard children from dogs that might attack or bite.
- Ensure small children cannot wonder into animal pens and stockyards with confined stock.
- Help kids identify characteristics that predict the behavior of animals.
- Remind children to paly away from animals and to stay outside of the fence.





#### **ATV Safety**

- Prevent children from getting hurt by not allowing them to be extra riders.
- Children under the age of 16 should not ride on ATVs.
- If children are riding on an ATV make sure it is the right size and they have all the necessary protective equipment such as a helmet and chest protector.



#### Lawn and Yard Safety

- Pick up litter in the yard before mowing.
- Young children must not be allowed to play in or around areas where lawn mowers or other yard equipment are being used or stored.
- Children under the age of six should be kept indoors during mowing.
- Never allow children to ride with you while mowing.
- Children should not operate lawn mowers until they have displayed the necessary levels of judgement, strength, coordination and maturity.
- Children operating lawn mowers should also be educated in the mower's use and safety.


Whereas: Grand Forks is the only community within North Dakota with active patrol programs within its schools.

#### What is Find Safe?

Find Safe is a program funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), to assist in preventing injury to individuals with dementia and developmental disabilities. The Find Safe program works in conjunction with Project Lifesaver<sup>®</sup>, North Dakota law enforcement, and first responders.

#### Why enroll in Find Safe?

Wandering is a common behavior among those with cognitive conditions, and it can be dangerous and potentially life-threatening. Enrolling in North Dakota Find Safe, which is under the umbrella of the national Project Lifesaver®program, will ensure that in the event your loved one wanders, they will be located within a timely manner and returned home safely.

#### How does Find Safe work?

Individuals enrolled in Project Lifesaver<sup>®</sup> wear a small transmitter on the wrist or ankle that emits an individualized frequency signal. If the individual goes missing, the caregiver notifies their local emergency responder. Trained emergency responders and law enforcement will use the client's individualized frequency to locate their position. Knowledge given by the family is provided to the first responders so they will know how to best approach the individual and bring them back safely.
